Instructions to candidates:

- When you have finished, number the pages you have written e.g. 1 of 2 (if you have written 2 pages), 1 of 3 (if you have written 3 pages) etc.

Advice to candidates:

There are no 'right' answers to the questions: you will be judged on the intelligence of your ideas, and your ability to communicate them in English.

Spend five minutes **planning** your answers before writing. If you are unhappy with any part of your answer, cross it out and continue.

You should try to write at least two pages.

- The mood of the poem
- The structure of the poem

'The Right Word' by Imtiaz Dharker
