

Admissions Policy

1. INTRODUCTION

The British Section is part of a highly original plurilingual and pluricultural educational project based around the Lycée International, Saint-Germain-en-Laye, enabling pupils from a variety of linguistic and cultural backgrounds to pursue a bilingual and bicultural education in both English and French. As a result, students develop the knowledge, skills and cultural mobility to enable them to pursue higher education in the UK, France and further afield.

The British Section educates children from age 3 to 18 in one of five French host schools of which the Lycée International is the hub.

The British Section offers a mother-tongue English curriculum within the context of the French state school system and hence a primarily francophone educational environment. Pupils of all ages spend about three-quarters of lesson time in a French class learning in French and between 6 - 8 hours per week (depending on the year group) learning in English with British Section teachers.

The bilingual / bicultural curriculum (double-enseignement) requires commitment to both the British Section and the French education system. It is a challenging educational pathway that demands considerable academic ability and intellectual flexibility as well as motivation, engagement and resilience. Given these demands, as well as the fact that the demand for places far exceeds our capacity to accommodate all candidates, the British Section assesses all pupils who apply.

Parents are expected to support the school's pluricultural objectives and to take steps to understand and appreciate the different but complementary approaches to learning. Parents are also reminded that the host schools are French state schools and function accordingly. For example, parents must respect the French schools' administrative procedures.

2. POINTS OF ENTRY

There are three main routes into the British Section, designed to facilitate the integration of students with different linguistic profiles into the bilingual curriculum:

a. Fluent English <u>and</u> French speakers

Children who already speak both languages fluently will be considered for entry to both the mainstream British Section and French classes. Should the assessment process reveal weakness in one of the languages, the applicant may be considered for either *Français spécial* (see below) or the Fast-track English class in Le Pecq (as appropriate and depending on the availability of places).

b. Anglophone students (non-francophone)

Children who speak little or no French can join the British Section via one of the *Français spécial* classes, available from CE1 to Seconde. This involves an intensive one-year course in French before pupils are integrated into mainstream French

classes. During this year, pupils are also taught in English in the mainstream British Section classes.

c. Francophone students (pupils learning English as a foreign language)

Academically able francophone children with the ambition and motivation to become bilingual can enter the British Section through the Fast-track English classes in Le Pecq (starting in 6ème) or, later, through the specialised Seconde Accueil class at the Lycée International. Depending on satisfactory progress, and the availability of places, these students normally enter mainstream British Section classes in Seconde and Première respectively.

Year groups in France are made up according to the child's year of birth running from **January to December**.

The main points of entry to the British Section are:

Primary

Petite Section: creation of one class of approximately 12 children.

Grande Section: creation of two additional classes of approximately 15 children

each, one in Le Pecq and one in Saint-Germain-en-Laye.

CE1: class sizes increase to around 18 so there are generally up to 8

places created at this level.

At all other levels in Primary, any additional places are dependent upon pupil departures.

Secondary

6ème: - some additional places for bilingual (English and French)

children become available in mainstream British Section

classes;

- creation of Fast-track English class for up to 16 francophone speakers who wish to become bilingual.

Seconde: creation of *Seconde Accueil* for up to 14 francophone

speakers who wish to become bilingual.

It is rare that we admit students between 5ème and 3ème, and leavers are not necessarily replaced. We occasionally admit students at lycée level, in either Seconde or Première, but only exceptionally in Terminale.

Parents of potential applicants for 5ème and above are invited to contact the British Section's Admissions Officer for advice.

3. THE APPLICATION PROCEDURE

The deadlines for the receipt of applications, usually in January, differ according to the class for which you are applying and are published on our website (see How to Apply).

Applications for entry outside the period of assessment will be dealt with on an individual basis, subject to the availability of places.

How to apply for a place in the British Section:

To proceed with an application for your child to the British Section, please:

- 1. Make the non-refundable application fee:
 - 160 € for maternelle applications,
 - 200 € for primary applications, and
 - 250 € for collège and lycée-level applications.

- 2. Upon receipt of payment, you will be sent by email our online questionnaire and the "dossier d'inscription" (application form) to complete for each child. When completing the questionnaire, you will be required to upload the following scans:
 - the completed "dossier d'inscription" including an identity photo of the applicant on the top right-hand corner of the page,
 - a photocopy of the child's birth certificate or other official ID,

- a letter from the parents addressed to Mr James Cathcart, Director, British Section, with:
 - o details of your child's previous schooling, and
 - o your motivation for applying to the British Section.
 - School reports covering the last two school years (where possible), for children aged 6 or above, two recent examples of written expression (corrected schoolwork) in English.

Please note:

- All completed applications are reviewed as quickly as possible, but this process
 can take several weeks due to the increasing volume of applications we receive
 and the thoroughness with which we consider each one;
- Due to the large number of applications we receive, incomplete applications will not be processed.

4. RESIDENCE

It is not necessary to have residential status in France before making an application but the British Section will expect families to live within a 15-kilometre radius of the school their child attends.

The British Section and host schools **do not** provide boarding facilities. Given the real challenges involved with the dual curriculum, it is highly recommended that pupils live at home with their parents or legal guardians who can give them the support they need.

5. THE ASSESSMENT PROCESS

The purpose of assessing candidates is to identify and admit children who demonstrate the potential and commitment to thrive in bilingual education, and who will contribute to, and benefit from, the ethos and opportunities available.

In addition to reviewing the application, we also typically assess candidates through a written task and an interview at the school. A French test and, where considered appropriate, a Mathematics test in French is also arranged in the following cases:

- a) candidates applying for full-time places in Grande Section;
- b) candidates applying for places in CP;
- c) candidates transferring from schools in France or abroad that are not recognised by the French national education system; and
- d) candidates applying for a place in *Français spécial* (available from CE1 up to Seconde, see Table 1 above).

Decisions are made based on our evaluation of all elements of the application.

It is important to note that the British Section's decision to offer a place must be approved by the French administration before the place can be confirmed. The British Section makes recommendations to the French authorities and decisions are then finalised taking into account the whole field of applications from all 14 international Sections. The British Section will endeavour to communicate decisions to families as promptly and efficiently as possible.

Applicants living abroad (candidates for 6ème upwards only)

It may, in exceptional cases, be possible to arrange written tests and interviews by distance for those candidates who are unable to come to France during the admissions period. Please contact the Admissions Officer for advice.

6. FURTHER DETAILS ABOUT ASSESSMENT

Maternelle & Primary

We are looking for age-appropriate ability in speaking, listening, reading and writing in English, and the potential and support to maintain development of these skills whilst being educated in a primarily francophone environment.

Petite Section to CP

Candidates are assessed orally for their communication and language skills, and their potential for development, using a selection of resources chosen to stimulate discussion. We also consider depth and range of vocabulary, accuracy in the use of English, the extent and use of general knowledge in conversation, willingness and ability to sustain a conversation, perceptiveness, engagement whilst on a task, and the ability to deal with simple and multi-step instructions. Interviews are held individually and last for approximately 20 minutes.

CE1/CE2

In addition to the above, there is a writing assessment. We are looking for fluency and understanding in speaking and reading, as well as understanding of sentence structure, syntax and grammar in writing appropriate to the child's age. The assessment is organised individually and lasts for approximately 45 minutes.

CM1/CM2

Candidates are assessed using a standardised reading test, as well as comprehension, spelling and creative-writing tasks. We are looking for imagination/creative thinking and logical thought, as well as a good vocabulary, effective sentence construction, and accurate spelling and punctuation appropriate to the child's age. The candidates may also participate in a (group) discussion with a British Section teacher. The assessment lasts approximately two hours.

Français spécial (CE1 to CM2)

In addition to the tests mentioned above, individual interviews are arranged in English and French to assess the child's potential to learn in a bilingual and bicultural environment; in particular, their processing skills, perceptiveness, willingness to learn and resilience.

Candidates are not required to bring books, projects or other work with them to interview.

Secondary

Mainstream British Section classes:

- Candidates take a written examination in English. We set our own
 assessments which involve reading comprehension exercises, open-ended
 writing tasks and language exercises. We are looking for creative thinking and
 logical thought, as well as a good vocabulary, effective sentence construction,
 and accurate spelling and punctuation appropriate to the child's age.
- Interviews will be arranged for candidates who demonstrate strong potential
 in the written test. Interviews last approximately 20 minutes. The aim of the
 interview is to explore the candidate's analytical skills, creative thinking and
 potential to thrive in bi-lingual education. The style of the interview is
 intended to be an informal discussion. Candidates are not required to bring
 books, projects or other work with them to interview.

Francophone students:

- Fast-track English (6ème): candidates take a written test at the Collège Pierre et Marie Curie in the winter term (see our website for details). Candidates who demonstrate sufficient linguistic potential will normally be invited to an interview lasting approximately 15 minutes. Evidence of the candidate's motivation and commitment to learning English at native speaker level is considered a crucial criterion for admission, as is the family's support for the bi-lingual curriculum and British education and culture more generally. It is not necessary for candidates to have been educated in English nor to have lived in an Anglophone country, although some candidates may have. Students in the Fast-track English class are assessed for their ability to study a native speaker English Literature and History/Geography curriculum during the final two years of collège and they are expected to demonstrate a genuine commitment to the British Section curriculum to be considered for admittance to the mainstream British Section classes at the Lycée International in Seconde.
- Seconde Accueil: selected candidates take a written test at the Lycée
 International in January or early February (see our website for details).
 Candidates who demonstrate a sufficient level of English language proficiency
 (CEFR/CECRL level B2) and advanced analytical thinking skills will normally be
 invited to interview. Students admitted to the Seconde Accueil class are
 assessed for their ability to study a native speaker English Literature and

History/Geography curriculum by the end of the year. They are also expected to demonstrate a genuine commitment to the British Section curriculum to be considered for admittance to the mainstream British Section classes at the Lycée International in Première.

SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES

We recognise that a candidate's performance may be affected by particular circumstances, for example:

- illness during tests or a lengthy absence from school;
- particular family circumstances such as a recent bereavement;
- a disability or specific learning needs.

Parents should inform the school as soon as possible if any of these, or any other circumstances considered relevant, apply. Depending on the circumstances, we may request further information such as a medical certificate before deciding whether or not to make any reasonable adjustments. A candidate with specific learning needs or disabilities will be required to submit a copy of a valid report from an appropriately qualified teacher, Educational Psychologist, or other specialist, together with any other information the British Section may reasonably request. A copy of the report or the letter from the school should be received by the Admissions Officer no later than one week before the date of the child's assessment in the British Section.

7. NOTIFICATION OF DECISIONS

We aim to inform families whether we are recommending their child for a place either just prior to or just after the Spring holidays. Once the candidates have been assessed, they are placed on the British Section lists in order of merit and our recommendations are then forwarded to the French administration. Parents should be aware that there may be a delay at this stage as the French administration has to process not only our applications but also all applications from the other twelve national sections.

Candidates who have not had places confirmed by July will be placed on a waiting list and may be offered a place if any become available during the summer holidays due to unexpected departures. The enrolment situation may evolve considerably towards the end of the academic year, and sometimes places become available as late as September.

8. ALLOCATION OF PLACES

Primary

Successful candidates will generally be offered a place at the school that is nearest to the family's home. Pupils joining the British Section outside one of the main points of entry will be offered a place wherever there is a vacancy.

The *externé* system (Ecole Internationale only)

Pressure on places is such across the different national sections that the Ecole Internationale can only accommodate a limited number of 'full-time' pupils. 'Full-time' in this sense means that the child obtains a place in a French class at the Ecole Internationale. Most successful candidates will therefore be offered an *externé* place. The *externé* system allows pupils to attend their local French primary school and to be released to attend British Section lessons at the Ecole Internationale on the two half-days relevant to their year group. British Section primary classes at the Ecole Internationale therefore consist, in varying proportions, of children who are 'full-time' at the Ecole Internationale and those who attend just for the British Section classes as *externés*.

Allocation of full-time places at the Ecole International

The British Section is accorded a limited number of full-time places in the various year groups across Primary at the Ecole International each year. Decisions about which children will be recommended for a full-time place and their order of precedence will be based on a variety of factors including academic performance and well-being issues, and will remain at the discretion of the British Section's senior leadership team. The final decision about which pupils are offered full-time places remains with the Proviseur who mediates between the requests of the 14 different sections.

We understand that some parents find the alternative to full-time education at the Ecole Internationale a challenging prospect. In such cases, it is worth remembering that the *externé* system has been developed in order to enable as many children as possible to benefit from the enriching opportunity of a bilingual education.

Secondary

Collège: successful candidates joining the British Section from outside are generally offered places at one of our partner collèges, either Collège Pierre et Marie Curie (Le Pecq) or Collège les Hauts Grillets (Saint-Germain-en-Laye) depending on their residential address.

Français spécial

Depending on the number of applications in a given year, Français spécial classes may be amalgamated so that two year-groups are taught together; for example, 6ème and 5ème-aged pupils may be taught in a combined class. The decision as to which year group's curriculum the class will follow will depend on the composition of the class and, once decided, the pupils will follow the timetable for this year-group. Consequently, Français spécial pupils will be placed in the British Section class that corresponds with the year-group chosen for the Français spécial class. At the end of the year in Français spécial, pupils who have made satisfactory progress normally join one of the mainstream French classes for their age-appropriate year-group. Should the Français spécial class be aligned with the younger year group, pupils in the elder age bracket may have the option of continuing in the year-group which follows the Français spécial class to enable them to consolidate their French, if required. This decision will be made in consultation between the pupil, their parents, the Français spécial teachers, the British Section and the French administration.

9. FEEDBACK

The British Section is unable to give feedback for individual children due to the volume of applications.

10. EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES

Our aim is to encourage applications from candidates with a diverse range of backgrounds. The British Section will consider candidates for admission regardless of their race, ethnicity, religion, disability or social background.

11. SIBLING POLICY

Each child is assessed on his/her own merits and there may be occasions where we judge that a sibling is likely to thrive better in a different academic environment.

12. COMPLAINTS

We hope that you and your child will have no cause for complaints about our admissions process. However, a copy of the British Section's complaints procedure can be sent to you upon request to the Admissions Officer.
